From the Desk of the CEO

Greetings to the people of Sandstone Shire and Visitors

The Council has set its rates for 2024/2025 financial year and has decided on a very modest 2.5% increase which is below the State CPI which for the year is about 3.4%. This is currently subject to advertising as required by Regulations.

Some might ask why have a rate increase at all? A rate increase is necessary to keep some parity with the cost of living increases and unless a local government has a new source of revenue, it will be unable to meet its financial commitments such as maintenance of assets and service delivery.

The Council has approved the purchase of two accommodation units for the Caravan Park which will arrive on site about mid-May. These are funded by the Federal government from under its Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program (LRCIP).

The tree management program will commence on Monday 10th June when Aussie Tree Services will arrive in Sandstone. They will be here for two weeks carrying out pruning of many trees and removal of some trees.

If people want tree servicing carried out on private property please leave the details of what you want at the Shire office.

There will be 50 Kurrajong trees arriving this month along with rose bushes and citrus trees. Some of these will be used to replace trees which are to be removed plus many new plantings. Additional plantings will be used to further beautify the town. Overall, there will be far more trees and smaller plants than are here at present. This project is also funded under the LRCIP grant.

Council has discussed various options on how best it can serve the community with the hotel being closed. The former shop will be opened and operated privately and the owners plan on acquiring a take-away liquor licence.

More work has been carried out on the public fuel bowser to have this working as it should – reliably. We recently changed the internet from Telstra, which is unreliable, to Starlink. Unfortunately, the owners of the electronic card system did not correctly align their system with that in the bowser. The recent correction seems to be functioning as it should.

A new air pump has been installed at the bowser site. When using the pump it may take a minute or so before it starts to pump, so don't give up.

Can Moths Sense Earth's Magnetic Field?

In the late 1960s, a scientist named Ronald Lockley wrote, "How do animals find their way over apparently trackless country, through pathless forests, across empty deserts, over and under featureless seas?...They do so, of course, without any visible compass, sextant, chronometer, or chart..."

Indeed, it has long been known that nearly all types of creatures, from bacteria to foxes, have some type of internal magnetic compass.

Professor Eric Warrant, a biologist at Lund University in Sweden, has been conducting navigation research on gray-brown bogong moths in Australia. In addition, other research regarding moth navigation has also been recently done on the death's-head hawkmoth.

Professor Warrant has found that gray-brown bogong moths fly over 620 miles (1,000 kilometers) from the plains in eastern Australia to the caves in the southeastern Australian Alps to escape the oppressive summer. They enter a dormant state until the fall, when they fly back to procreate, lay eggs, and die.

It was suspected that the little moths were possibly using Earth's magnetic field as a navigational aid, so the team set up an experiment, "[tethering] migrating bogong moths in an outdoor flight simulator. In doing so, the researchers confirmed that the moths did indeed use the Earth's magnetic field to navigate."

But there were—and are—more questions to further unlock this unique navigational mystery:

While it has been known that insects, birds, turtles and fish can navigate using the Earth's magnetic field, the specific mechanisms employed to activate this "sixth sense" have remained mysterious. So too has the connection with other potential sensory cues.

As investigation continued, there were surprises for the team. Specifically, the moths evidently use the stars to aid in their flight plans.

Warrant said the ability to use sky cues to navigate in a specific compass direction was previously found only in humans and in some species of nocturnally migrating birds. The moths possess it while having a much smaller head.

The moths seem able to travel in their inherited migratory direction under a starry night sky even if we remove Earth's magnetic field, Warrant said. If you have this tiny insect with a brain a tenth the volume of a grain of rice and eyes smaller than a pinhead, that they can do this is surprising.

Yes, incredibly surprising. Chance, time, and natural processes are not able to explain this amazing navigational ability packed in a tiny section of an insect brain.

There is evidence that, like these little moths, birds also use a complex protein in their eyes called cryptochromes to sense magnetic fields. Cryptochromes are flavin-containing blue-light photoreceptors, are unevolved, and have always been cryptochromes. They appear fully functional in plants and animals such as bogong moths. But evolution desperately appeals to cryptochromes evolving, and, therefore, appeal to convergent evolution, believing the cryptochrome proteins repeatedly evolved new functions in different creatures.

The scientists think that a good candidate for a magnetic-sensing function in the bogong moth is cryptochrome 4a, also known as Cry4a. This amazing protein is evidence that moths (and migrating birds) may sense or actually see magnetic fields, "This cryptochrome seems to have the right properties to be the basis of the birds' magnetic compass," said chemist Peter Hore, a professor at the University of Oxford, UK.

Special Days in May

3 May - World Press Freedom Day

In 2024, World Press Freedom Day is dedicated to the importance of journalism and freedom of expression in the context of the current global environmental crisis.

Awareness of all aspects of the global environmental crisis and its consequences is essential to build democratic societies. Journalistic work is indispensable for this purpose.

5 May - World Laughter Day

The first "World Laughter Day" gathering took place in Mumbai, India, on 11th of January 1998. 12,000 members from local and international Laughter Clubs joined together in a mega laughter session (the number is valid because

that's how many meals were served.)

"HAPPY-DEMIC" was the first World Laughter Day gathering outside India. It took place on 9th January 2000, in Copenhagen, Denmark and more than 10,000 people gathered in the Town Hall Square. The event went into the Guinness Book of World records.

World Laughter Day is now celebrated on the first Sunday of May every year in most large cities around the world. Hundreds of people (oftentimes thousands) gather worldwide on that day to laugh together.



IND is celebrated around the world every May 12, the anniversary of Florence Nightingale's birth. ICN commemorates this important day each year with the production and distribution of the International Nurses' Day (IND) resources and evidence.

19 May - Endangered Species Day



Every year on the third Friday in May, thousands of people around the world participate in Endangered Species Day by celebrating, learning about, and taking action to protect threatened and endangered species. This global day of action and celebration was created and founded by David Robinson and the Endangered Species Coalition in 2006, and has continued ever since.

On Endangered Species Day 2024, wildlife refuges, gardens, schools, libraries, museums, community groups, nonprofits, and individuals will hold special programs or events. People around the world participate in these activities and others.

21 May - International Tea Day

Tea is a beverage made from the Camellia sinesis plant. Tea is the world's most consumed drink, after water. It is believed that tea originated in northeast India, north Myanmar and southwest China, but the exact place where the plant first grew is not known. Tea has been with us for a long time. There is evidence that tea was consumed in China 5,000 years ago.

Tea production and processing constitutes a main source of livelihoods for millions of families in developing countries and is the main means of subsistence for millions of poor families, who live in a number of least developed countries.



May's planets are lining up for their close approaches with the Moon this month, with Saturn, Mars, and Mercury getting up close and personal with our planet's only natural satellite.



Close approach of Saturn and the Moon | 4th May

The Moon and Saturn are the first conjunction (a *conjunction* is where two astronomical objects, likes planets, appear close together in the sky), appearing in the early morning of 4th May. The pair are rising together in the early morning sky, the Moon first at 2.10am followed by Saturn just after 2.20am.

When to look: From around 2.30am, 4th May

Which direction to look: Look to the eastern horizon: Saturn and the moon are in the constellation of Aquarius.

Close approach of Mars and the Moon | 5th May

The Moon and Mars take the opportunity on 5th May to make a close approach in the hours before daybreak. The moon comes up around 3.20am, and the red planet is close behind at around 3.35am.

When to look: From around 3.45am, 5th May

Which direction to look: Look to the eastern horizon: Mars and the moon are in the constellation of Pisces.

Close approach of Mercury and the Moon | 6th May

Not to be outdone by the others, the Moon and Mercury, will make their own close approach in the early morning of 6th May. The Moon is rising just before 4.30am, and Mercury, messenger of the gods, follows about 20 minutes later.

When to look: From just before dawn, around 5.15am, 6th May

Which direction to look: Look to the eastern horizon: Mercury and the moon are in the constellation of Pisces.

Fire Sensory Capabilities of the Venus Flytrap

Fascinating discoveries have been made regarding the amazing Venus flytrap (*Dionaea muscipula*).1 For example, all parts of this amazing plant must work together to maintain its carnivorous function. ICR's Brian Thomas said:

...the Venus flytrap is irreducibly complex, which is to say that if one part is removed, the whole system is rendered useless. For example, if snap-trap plants could not discern insects from inedible items, random debris would trigger the doors but provide no nutrients. The plant can only reload three or four times before it must reap some benefits from its labour.



Fires are a constant threat in the wild, but God has designed plants and animals to sense heat and respond. Obviously, plants cannot flee from the flames, but in the case of the Venus flytrap, It has an amazing system to protect the vital snap traps and sensory hairs from fire.

Recently, biophysicists at the University of Würzburg in Germany found that this remarkable plant of North Carolina can be surrounded by dry grass in the summer, but they recognize a difficulty with the discovery.

Without natural fire, the *Dionaea* populations would decline. How does *Dionaea* survive and even thrive after swamp fires? Here, we ask whether flytraps recognize heat waves at the forefront of swamp fires and demonstrate that a heat-sensor-based alarm may provide a fire survival strategy for them. In this study, we show that flytraps become electrically excited and close in response to a heat wave.

"[A] heat-sensor-based alarm" certainly doesn't sound like it's a result of chance, time, and natural processes. In addition, the flytrap evidently can sense the wave of heat which comes ahead of the fire itself. "The JMU [Julius-Maximilians-University] researchers were correct in their assumption: a hot air blower directed at the trap was sufficient to cause the trap to close."

The plant has a number of critical signalling systems inside cells using the element calcium. Calcium ions (Ca2+) can enter the plant cell through receptor-gated or voltage-gated calcium channels in the cell's membrane. The Science Daily article reports,

...[The researchers] are pursuing the hypothesis that a calcium channel is an integral part of the heat sensor, or even the sensor itself. If this is true, a type of membrane-bound temperature sensor would have been discovered that is still completely unknown in plants. So far, research knows calcium channels from the so-called OSCA family [calcium-permeable channel], which can be activated mechanically and osmotically [fluid passing through a semipermeable membrane from an area of low solute concentration to a higher solute concentration]."

One of the more amazing discoveries in this research was a heat sensor in the flytrap leaf that activates at 37 and 55 degrees Celsius, producing specific action potentials. This taps into what biochemists have described as the depolarization of the membrane called the all-or-nothing law.

[Dr. Shouguang Huang] found that when a local leaf temperature of 37 degrees Celsius was exceeded, the heated area of the trap produced an electrical impulse, an action potential that spread across both halves of the trap. "When the temperature increased further to 55 degrees Celsius, a second action potential was triggered and the trap snapped shut," Shouguang said. But the trap's reaction at 37 and 55 degrees Celsius *only kicked in when temperatures increased abruptly, as in a rapid heat wave.*

Thus, not only does this plant have a thermometer to measure preset temperatures, but it also has a stopwatch of sorts that measures the speed of temperature change—and both functions come fully integrated with each other and with the plant—just like they were put there on purpose. Scientists have been developing a model called Continuous Environmental Tracking (CET). It purports that animals and plants are equipped with sensors, logic, and outputs.6 The discovery of exactly these features in the flytrap adds to the growing list of examples of CET in action.

To conclude, Huang and Hedrich said in *Current Biology* "We propose that by sensing the temperature differential, flytraps can recognize the heat of an approaching fire, thus closing before the trigger hairs are burned, while they can continue to catch prey throughout hot summers.



Ingredients

- * 28g / 1oz margarine
- 28g / 1 oz sugar
- * 1 egg, beaten
- * 56g / 2 oz self-raising flout
- 2 Tbs syrup or jam



Method

Place the jam in the bottom of a small microwave bowl (550ml).

In a separate bowl, beat all the other ingredients together until smooth.

Spoon the smooth mixture over the jam.

Cover the dish with a microwaveable lid or cling wrap (pierce it).

Place in the microwave and cook on medium for 2.5 to 3 minutes.

Leave to stand for 3 minutes before turning out into a bowl.

Serve immediately with custard or cream / ice cream.

Tip: you can also microwave a couple of tablespoons of your topping syrup mixed with a tablespoon of boiling water which you can pour over the pudding to serve.

DID YOU KNOW ...

Each insect is a host to ten bacterial species?

There are around 2 billion species on Earth - with 6.8 million likely to be species of insects. And up to 10 types of bacteria lives inside of each of these insects.

Tea and coffee will be provided. Bring a small plate for morning tea / light lunch to share.


